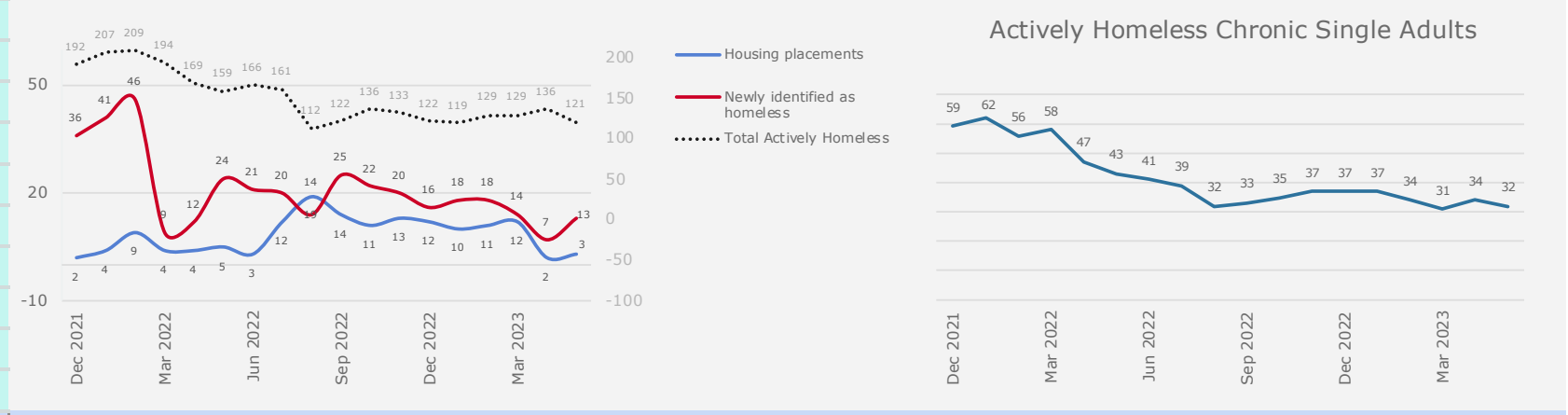

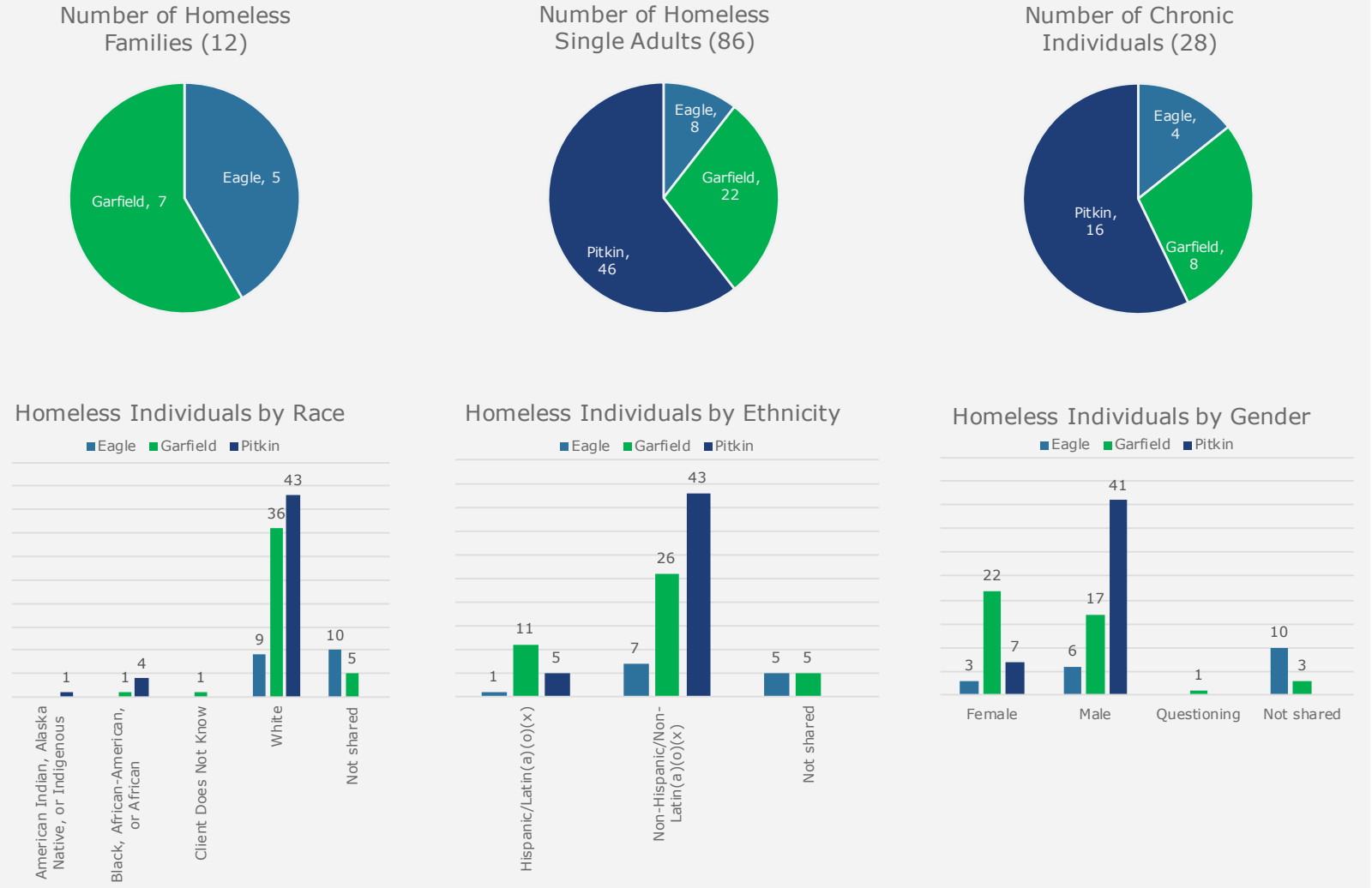

Data Type	Options	Definition
Dashboard Data*	Total Actively Homeless Individuals (includes those in families)	This includes single adults of all types: Chronic, non-Chronic, Veteran, family members, and other youth
	Homeless individuals in families	Individuals that meet the criteria as a family, which is two or more people that are unhoused that would be under the same roof (household) if housed
	Homeless families	Total families (see above for definition). Does not include those that classified as single
	Housing placements	individuals placed in housing under a program listed above
	Individuals Moved to inactive	Individuals that moved to inactive status (see definition above)
	No longer meets population criteria	A person or family (head of household) that is active put changed status from one population category to another, such as single adult becoming married and thus becoming a family
	Newly identified as homeless	Those that became active that were not previously active and are being tracked in the coordinated entry system (and BNL) when no record existed before
	Returned to active list from housing	Was housed (and inactive) and became active due to loss of housing and engaging with service providers once again
	Returned to active list from inactive	Was inactive (see definition for inactive) and returned to active due to seeking services

Household Type	Options	Definition
Household Type	Family	A group of two or more persons with minors. For HMIS purposes, a family does not need to have any legal documentation of marital or adoption status and do not have to be related by birth.
	Senior	A person who is at retirement age, or a person that has reached age 62 or older. Age >= 62.
	Single Adult	A person who is fully grown and lives by themselves. Ex: Couples, Partners. Age 25-61.
	Youth	All unaccompanied youth under the age of 25. Age <= 24.

BNL Status	Options	Definition
BNL Status	Active	Actively homeless households may reside in shelter, hotel payed by agencies, transitional housing, or in a location not meant for human habitation (on street, beach/riverbed, in car, etc). Actively homeless households may have received a voucher or subsidy. However, if they have not yet moved into a permanent housing unit, they should still be counted as actively homeless.
	Inactive	The total number of households experiencing homelessness who have been designated as "inactive" on your community's By-Name List over the course of the reporting month (BFZ). Ex: Deceased/ No Contact/ No Show (after 3 attempts)/ Moved out of area/ Cannot be located/ incarcerated or in an institutions/ Declined Services. Inactive status means that a household has not been placed into housing, but also is not actively engaged in services. It is possible these individuals or households may have self-resolved their lack of housing, moved out of the community, or even been admitted to an institution for a long-term 90 days stay (e.g. incarceration, long-term hospital stay). Clients who are unable to be located after 90 days and 3 good faith attempts to outreach shall be exited from their Coordinated Entry program in HMIS with an exit destination. (HMIS). HOUSED: The total number of households experiencing homelessness who moved into permanent housing over the course of the reporting month. Ex: Rental by Client/ Owned by Client/ Staying with family or friends (HMIS). Rapid-Rehousing/ Permanent Supportive Housing/ SELF housed/ Subsidy/ Vouchers (BFZ).
	Housed	The total number of households experiencing homelessness who have lost their "population" status over the course of the month. Ex: if someone is designated as a single adult and then has has a child that person would no longer meet the population criteria for single adult and would be newly identified as a family.
	No longer meets population criteria	The total number of households experiencing homelessness who have lost their "population" status over the course of the month.

Current Housing Type	Options	Definition
Current Housing Type	At Risk of Homelessness	An individual or family who has insufficient resources immediatelt available to maintain housing stability and will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence, provided that: 1) Residence will be lost within 14 days of the date of application for homeless assistance;2) No subsequent residence has been identified; and 3) The individual or family lacks the resources or support networks needed to obtain other permanent housing.Note: Includes individuals and families who are within 14 days of losing their housing, including housing they own, rent, are sharing with others, or are living in without paying rent. Ex: Landlord is sending eviction letter, demand of compliance (14 days), behind on paying rent.
	Place not meant for Habitation (Outdoors)	The situation when someone lives on the streets, with nowhere to sleep at night or sleeps in a place not meant for human habitation. Ex: Cars, Parks, Sidewalks, Abandoned Buildings,Camps, Street, etc.
	Institution	Stays in institution of 90 days or more constitute a break in homelessness and do not count toward total time homeless. Ex: Jail, hospital, detox center, psychiatrist, inpatient treatment setting.

	Shelter	Any facility, the primary purpose of which is to provide temporary shelter for the homeless in general or for specific populations of the homeless. Example: Hotel, Motel, Winter-OverNight Shelter, Family/ Friends. Additionally, A person that only lives in a hotel would be considered 'homeless'. Also, if client is paying for the hotel with no voucher or subsidy (self pay/paid by family or friend) this is not considered a homeless situation. This is only a homeless situation if the hotel is paid for by a voucher or other subsidy.
	Data Not Collected	The data value that is not stored for a variable in the observation of interest. Ex: Missing Data, Incomplete Data
	Housed	The total number of households experiencing homelessness who moved into permanent housing via Rental by Client/ Owned by Client/ Staying with family or friends etc. Ex: Rapid-Rehousing, Permanent Supportive Housing, SELF housed, Vouchers etc.
Veteran Status	Yes	Anyone who has ever been on active duty in the armed forces of the United States, regardless of discharge status or length of service. "Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard: Active duty begins when a military member reports to a duty station after completion of training. Veteran status is not dependent on discharge status. Reserves and National Guard:
	No	-Individuals who attended training but were discharged before reporting to a duty station -Reservists or National Guard who were never activated or deployed
Veteran Type	Honorable Discharge	General discharge under honorable conditions. Eligible for VA benefits.
	Less than Honorable Discharge	"bad conduct discharge". This designation is a barrier to receiving veterans benefits. A dishonorable discharge limits eligibility for certain VA benefits and programs, but it does not mean the person is not a veteran.
	Unknown	Not known or not well-known
Chronic Status	Yes	Has experienced homelessness for 12 months in last 3 years or longer AND has a disabling condition. Homeless for 4-5 times in last 3 years. In institution for less than 90 days (HMIS)
	No	Has experienced homelessness for 12 months in last 3 years or longer AND has a disabling condition. Homeless for 4-5 times in last 3 years. In institution for less than 90 days (HMIS)
Program	Rapid Rehousing	A project that provides housing relocation and stabilization services and short- and/or medium-term rental assistance as necessary to help a homeless individual or family move as quickly as possible into permanent housing and achieve stability in that housing. Temporary housing assistance to quickly move individuals from homelessness to permanent housing. RRH is permanent housing that provides short-term (up to three months) and medium-term (4-24 months) tenant-based rental assistance and supportive services to households experiencing homelessness.
	Emergency Shelter	A project that offers temporary shelter (lodging) for the homeless in general or for specific populations of the homeless. Temporary shelter under emergency circumstances (cold, illness, hospital discharge, transition from incarceration, fragility)
	Permanent Supportive Housing	A project that offers permanent housing and supportive services to assist homeless persons to live independently with housing stability. A permanent housing in which housing assistance (e.g., long-term leasing or rental assistance) and supportive services. Ex: a community build (16 units) to hardest, chronically homeless people with a lot of barriers.
	Diversion Assistance	Emergency services that takes community resources and helping homeless clients with services to stabilize them. Ex: Eviction protection, rental assistance, utility assistance, transportation assistance using different grants.
	Street Outreach	A project that offers services necessary to reach out to unsheltered homeless people, connect them with emergency shelter, housing, or critical services, and provide urgent, non-facility-based care to unsheltered homeless people who are unwilling or unable to access emergency shelter, housing, or an appropriate health facility. Only persons who are "street homeless" should be entered into a street outreach project. Homeless Street Outreach through Mind Springs Health,
	VASH Voucher	Veterans Affairs supportive housing: Housing Choice Voucher combined with rental assistance for participating veterans. A rental vouchers used specifically for homeless veterans.
	Mainstream Voucher	A tenant-based vouchers that serve a special population of households that include an adult non-elderly person(s) with disabilities. Mainstream vouchers assist non-elderly persons with disabilities.
	Emergency Housing Voucher	A housing voucher that provides assistance to Public Housing Authorities for families who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, fleeing DV (attempt to flee, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, trafficking), recently homeless, or high risk of housing instability.
	Housing Choice Voucher	Assistance for very low-income families, the elderly, and disabled to afford decent, safe, sanitary housing in private market.
	Others	Any other programs or vouchers not indicated in the list can be listed here with elaboration in Notes.
